Together, we will get through this.



Continuing the trend of 2018, Blackfalds experienced a reduction in building permits in 2019 due to the economic conditions in Alberta.

Development of single family dwellings decreased to nearly half in 2019 with a total of 17 permits as compared to 26 in 2018.

The total dollar value of permits for commercial and industrial increased from nearly 2 million in 2018 to 13 million in 2019 which included the new Buy Low Foods grocery store, McDonalds restaurant and Blackfalds Crossing Phase 1A.

Total dollar value of permits tripled in 2020 which included the overall value of the Arena Expansion project \$24.6 Mil.



Infrastructure & Environmental Services

This department is made up of Public Works and office staff that keep Town services moving. This includes construction of new service, ongoing operations and maintenance of roadways, sidewalks, water, sewer, stormwater, and environmental management.



Abbey Centre

The Abbey Centre had a very different year in 2020 as compared to previous years due to the COVID-19 pandemic which caused a huge disruption to regular operations as the numbers will show. Despite the challenges and adapting operations to provincial restrictions, the Abbey was able to bring in additional fitness equipment, run its summer programs and implement a max. 200 person capacity at 2 hour intervals with half hour cleaning and sanitation time slots.

The COVID-19 pandemic of 2020 created many challenges for enforcement, resulting in a lower than normal call volume.



Added one position bringing total to 4 full time Community Peace Officers.



2020 saw an increase of bike patrols to monitor parks and streets.

Many of the community relations events such as Kids & Kops, Bike Rodeo and other activities were cancelled in 2020 as a result of health restrictions put in place by the Province.

RCMP

Developed new protocols for policing during a pandemic to ensure the health and safety of their staff and clients.



Criminal Code file work saw an overall decrease of 14%.



Crimes against persons saw an 8 % increase overall from the previous year.



Motor vehicle collisions saw a 6 % decrease overall with the largest decrease being

in reportable motor vehicle collisions, while injury collisions remained the same at 4 in total.

The RCMP were able to maintain a full staffing compliment during 2020 and are looking forward to adding a new position in 2021.
