#### **GENERAL**

Goodbye Winter, hello Spring!

The ice sheet in Arena 2 at the Eagle Builders Centre was removed at the end of March allowing ample time for the Parks crew to prepare for the upcoming lacrosse season. Parks & Facilities staff have been going the extra mile making sure all parks and trails are adequately maintained for public use.

The Restriction Exemption Program was rescinded on February 9 which allowed the ability for all to attend the Abbey Centre regardless of vaccination status. This resulted in a considerable increase in booking of town facilities, use of child minding, usage of registered fitness programs and attendance in drop in classes. We attracted **5976** daily admissions and **19,333** member visits in this quarter.

The Eagle Builders Centre and Servus Credit Union Public Library continue to be well utilized by the community and remain steady with bookings. The Blackfalds Bulldogs hosted 29 games in their new home arena during their inaugural season. Go Bulldogs Go!

Projects such as the parking lot expansion of All-Star Park, Food Bank renovation, and the Border Paving Plaza are expected to be underway shortly with anticipated completion in the Fall of 2022.

Family and Community Support Services (FCSS) will announce the recipients of the Volunteer Recognition Awards on April 13. There was a total of **40 community members/groups nominated** for the 8 award categories. As a thank you FCSS will host a Community Volunteer Movie Nights presented by MEGlobal (April 28 & May 5).

Through the Community Volunteer Income Tax Program, community organizations host free tax clinics where volunteers file tax returns for eligible people. 3 FCSS staff and 2 town residents have been approved by the Canada Revenue Agency CVITP volunteers.

#### PARKS AND FACILITIES OPERATIONS:

#### **JANUARY**

- Parks staff did nine days of trail/sidewalk clearing.
- Light-Up Blackfalds Christmas light display was extended one week.

#### **FEBRUARY**

- Parks crew is preparing for spring planting and projects. They are also getting all
  equipment tuned up and ready for the upcoming season.
- Parks staff did six days of trail/sidewalk clearing.

#### MARCH

- Light-Up Blackfalds display is almost cleaned up for spring. There are still some posts remaining as we wait for the frost to come out.
- Parks staff did two days of trail/sidewalk clearing and facilities and trails were continually monitored for icy areas and sand applied as necessary.
- Closed the Willow Park ODR on March 3 and closed the Pine Crescent ODR and all outdoor ice surfaces on March 15<sup>th</sup>
- Summer Staff positions were posted and interviews started.
- Tender and Proposal packages were posted for a few Capital Projects: 2-Seater,
   4-Seater, and Wide Area Rotary Mower.
- Parks staff are gearing up for spring season.
  - Planters and hanging baskets have been taken to the greenhouse for preparation
  - Equipment maintenance and restocking supplies
- Arena #2 ice surface was removed on March 22. Ball hockey and lacrosse
  activities have started using the dry floor. Arena #1 ice is still in and being used
  throughout the evenings and weekends.
- In an effort to decrease the number of geese that make Centennial Park home, the Parks Division put out four solar powered beacons on Centennial Pond. As the geese continue to rise in numbers they cause damage to sports fields, playgrounds, private property, and there has been negative interactions (past summers) with the public users of the trails and green spaces. We are continuing to monitor and provide regular updates to the Recreation, Culture, and Parks Board.
  - The Parks team continues to monitor geese levels. The beacons are a
    less invasive control in the effort to decrease the number of geese making
    Centennial Park home. In addition to this effort, Parks continues to look
    at other landscaping controls. This area has virtually no natural predators
     making the area a very safe home for them.
- The Recreation, Culture, and Parks Board reviewed and accepted the Parks
  Operations Plan for the opening dates of the outdoor facilities. This Parks
  Operations Plan supports our staffing levels moving from winter to spring

operations and the addition of the summer laborers in May. All outdoor facilities timelines are weather dependent.

#### Community Garden:

- Opens the Friday of May long weekend
- Closed Tuesday after Thanksgiving long weekend

#### ➤ Bike Skills Park:

- Opens Friday of May long weekend
- Closed when weather doesn't permit safe riding or when riding will damage to the Park as well as our staffing isn't available to maintain any longer.

#### Water Spray Park:

- Opens the Friday after May long weekend
- Closed Tuesday after Sept long weekend
- Tennis Courts (two people half a day):
  - Not staff heavy and will be opened as soon as possible, weather permitting.

#### All-Star Park, Diamond #5 and #6, Soccer Fields:

- Minor Ball, Minor Soccer, and Slo-Pitch League all typically start the first week of May.
- Parks and Facilities Staff work on these facilities throughout April and have them ready for the user groups.

#### Skating Ponds:

- Are accessed with a walk behind snow blower with an ice thickness of
   7"
- Parks equipment will access the ice when the ice thickness is 12" (due to the weight of our equipment). This is our standard operating procedure.
- As the weather changes drill tests are conducted more frequently.
- Maintenance will continue until ice conditions deteriorate due to warm weather and conditions become unsafe.
- Outdoor Rinks and Willow Park Skating Loop (Willow Park and Pine Cr):
  - Work will begin when the ambient daily temperature is minus five (-5)
    degrees Celsius (or below), and these temperatures are consistent for
    five (5) days or longer.
  - Parks staff regularly monitor short and long-range weather forecasts and plan accordingly.
  - Maintenance (flooding and ice resurfacing) will continue until the first week in March or until ice conditions deteriorate due to warm weather and conditions become unsafe.

#### **ABBEY CENTRE OPERATIONS:**

- We completed the Abbey Centre Clothing Policy Survey on February 22.
   Through feedback gained through the survey we have updated the original policy of 2014. This was put into effective March 3.
- The REP program was rescinded on February 9 which allowed the ability for all to attend the Abbey Centre regardless of vaccination status.
- The Abbey Centre hosted the Archery Alberta Youth Championship Feb 18-20 and the Spring Market March 26-27. Both events went very well and had large attendances.
- Food Services was up and running for the Spring Market, the first time running since Winterfest in February of 2020
- As of March 1, COVID restrictions were lifted resulting in a considerable increase in booking of town facilities, use of child minding, usage of registered fitness programs and attendance in drop in classes.
- In March due to popularity, and to offer a safe place for the community to utilize regardless of weather or air quality, we extended the Track Only Option to yearround access.
- In mid-February Rick Kreklewich took on his new role as Director of Community Services with Carol Simpson as Acting General Manager. Carol became the permanent General Manager February 28.
- Due to the timing of COVID restrictions being lifted it was determined unfeasible to host Super Kids in 2022 but it will return strong and fabulous for 2023
- Vandalism remains an issue with destruction of the TransCanada Trail signage, breaking of basketball/soccer nets and the theft of brass pucks out of FH
- Seasonal Positions (Day Camp Leader, Aquatics Programmer, Shift Supervisor and Lifeguard/Instructor) were posted the end of February with interviews starting late March.
- C'amped registration for the first quarter was 74% and 70% during Spring break
- Thrifty Thursdays started March 3. Each month, we offer cost savings on various Abbey Centre services available only on the first Thursday of the month.
- We attracted 5976 daily admissions and 19,333 member visits in this quarter. Membership revenues for this quarter were \$101, 675, facility/program room rental fees were \$20,406 and day admission sales were \$33,961. As of March 31<sup>st</sup>, we had 347 annual members, 575 monthly members and 1661 punch pass holders.
- Staff coverage has remained a challenge at times due to the continued high transmissibility of the latest COVID strain.
- Focus has been put on getting staff training up to date for the first half of 2022.
   Renewal training in First Aid, WHMIS and FOIP have been completed as well as the new Respect in the Workplace training.

#### **FCSS OPERATIONS:**

#### Community Volunteer Income Tax Program:

- The Community Volunteer Income Tax Program (CVITP) is a collaboration between community organizations and the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA). The Town of Blackfalds is registered as a community organization offering the CVITP where volunteers file tax returns for eligible people.
  - 3 FCSS staff and 2 town residents have been approved by the Canada Revenue Agency CVITP volunteers
  - CVITP volunteer training has begun in preparation for this year's tax filing season
- Blackfalds Youth Crew: January 10 February 1 saw 91 youth in attendance.
- **Child Safe Canada** At Home Alone Safety offered January 19<sup>th</sup> with 14 youth in attendance.
- **Inspiring Virtues** (formally Grace Empowerment) Free to Be started on January 20<sup>th</sup> for youth grades 5 8. This 5-week session has 8 youth registered.
- **Upcoming Programming -** program planning for April August is underway, with the Program Guide deadline of February 14<sup>th</sup>.
- 18 Agencies attended **Interagency** using a virtual platform.
- **Christmas Bureau** wrap up was completed with the Beyond Food Community Hub, Blackfalds Food Bank partnership a huge success.
  - 90 Families, 33 seniors/singles, 222 children received gifts, gift cards and comprehensive holiday food hampers.
  - A grand total of \$35,320.923 was raised with an exceptional \$20,000 donated by Step Energy.
  - 74 volunteer hours were logged thanks to the dedication of the Blackfalds Fire Department & Christmas Bureau volunteers.

#### **PROJECTS**

- Parking lot of All-Star Park tender has been completed with 3 submissions and will be awarding the contract after councils' approval
- Civic Centre renovation is at 75% completion of construction drawings and should be ready for tender for mid April
- Design of the track/football field at the high school location is underway and should have the final design by the end of spring before construction of the high school gets underway
- Food bank renovation should be under way later this month as IMC will be under contract to start construction on the façade, kitchen, washrooms/offices. it should take 8 weeks roughly to complete.
- The Border Paving Plaza is still in the final stage of design and should be going out to tender shortly. Construction should be done in the Fall of 2022.

#### **EVENTS**

- Family Fun Day/Winterfest took place in February at the EBC where ice sculptures/fire department BBQ/ and public skating was a huge hit! Over 500 people took in the fun and enjoyed themselves.
- Planning is underway for Blackfalds Days where we had a 2-year hiatus (BOO).
  The Thursday-Sunday event will include a double feature drive in movie night at
  All-star Park, pancake breakfast put on by Blackfalds Council, community parade
  & market, kids' zone and library programs, youth night out and entertainment for
  all ages! Scaled back grand opening for the Eagle Builders Centre will take
  place Friday early evening.

#### **EAGLE BUILDERS CENTRE**

- Working with the Junior A team on the showcase at the end of September which will work in conjunction with Culture Days at the same time. Huge economic spinoff on this event as all 16 teams in the league will be in town for 3 days along with scouts from NHL, Canadian Colleges and the NCAA.
- Mini Rink was installed a month ago and it was a huge hit in the community.
- Acoustic panels have been ordered and will take up to 6 weeks to arrive and installation should take 7 to 10 days.
- Lacrosse has started the end of March at the EBC (Arena 2) and will continue for the next 3 months

#### ACKFALDS INFRASTRUCTURE AND PROPERTY SERVICES 1ST QUARTER **DIRECTOR'S REPORT**

#### **GENERAL:**

- In the first part of the 1st quarter, the Department suffered some more HR limitations due to medical and unplanned leaves. For 2022, the department has hired one full time operator, Brian Hickey. We are short one FT Planning and Development position and our asset management summer student hiring will be starting soon. We continue to limit our exposures through revisions to the policies and practices of the department and town. With Committee and Council meetings going back in person, this also changed the dynamic of the department in this quarter.
- The 2022 budget process is complete, and we have been working with the new 2022 budget to get projects finalized and tendered. Existing major capital projects are planned to start up again soon and will be finished in the 2022 season. Newly approved capital projects are being designed, tendered and scheduled for the 2022 construction season.
- General street sweeping works on Priority 1 routes without signage started on time this year through major thoroughfares. Signing and sweeping of subdivisions is next, weather dependent. We have started to communicate media information on sweeping areas as per our communication plans.
- The Director has closed Broadway Avenue north gravel section this year again and will continue to monitor and maintain this roadway to the best of our abilities with the frost still coming out of the ground. When reopened, at the end of April, this roadway will again be limited to 30km/h and no heavy vehicles are allowed.
- The Land Use Bylaw received First Reading at the March 22, 2022 Council meeting with a Public Hearing set for the April 26th Council meeting, and an anticipated passing of Second and Third Reading shortly thereafter.
- Outdated Policies and Procedures are being reviewed across the department for future revisions.

#### **PUBLIC WORKS OPERATIONS:**

- Snow removal was conducted as per the Snow Removal and Ice Control Policy, with snow removal focused on Priority 1, 2 & 3 routes. We were able to do the 4 and 5's and 6's this year as well.
- The Pioneer Lift Station required emergency repairs works in late March/early April. Our Operators noted that the lines from the lift station to the well were not holding suction, resulting in the pumps losing prime, and increased emergency call outs. Stantec Engineering conducted engineering and Pidherney's conducted with the emergency repairs.
- Public Works is assisting with the landscaping around Eagle Builders Center in collaboration with Parks Department.

#### ACKFALDS INFRASTRUCTURE AND PROPERTY SERVICES 1ST QUARTER **DIRECTOR'S REPORT**

#### PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT OPERATIONS:

- The updated Land Use Bylaw is currently in the formal adoption process with a Public Hearing scheduled for the April 26, 2022 Council meeting. The new Fees & Fines Bylaw, which received First Reading already, is being brought forward for approval in conjunction with the new Land Use Bylaw. We are optimistic both Bylaws will be in effect early on in the second guarter of 2022.
- Commercial and general inquiries are ongoing, and detailed reviews for all applications are ongoing. Detailed reviews for MPC applications ongoing as well as review of Real Property Reports for Compliance Certificates.
- Enforcement focus on Community Standards Bylaw, ongoing.
- The Annexation process of the Soper Lands (NE 24-39-27-W4M excluding Lot 1 Block 1 Plan 032 0195) is in progress. An Open House was held on March 31, 2022 with 24 attendees signing in. Comments on the proposed annexation are being excepted until April 14, 2022 and conversations with the public concerning the annexation is on going. The next step in the process is to prepare a Negotiation Report between Lacombe County, the initiating landowner, and Town representatives. This Negotiation Report will ultimately require a Public Hearing by both Lacombe County and the Town of Blackfalds prior to approving the report. This Negotiation Report forms an integral part of the formal annexation application to the Land & Property Rights Tribunal.
- Municipal Development Plan will be scheduled later into 2022 to allow for public input and good discussion with Council and Staff prior to start of process.
- Off-site Levies report review has been started by Stantec. Internal departmental discussions have begun. The next step will be for Public/Council consultation; planned to start in guarter 2 of 2022.
- Business Licensing (including taxis) and Animal Permits were set up for the new year and are currently being processed.
- The P&D Manager, Jolene, has been attending the Wolf Creek Public School Division, Boundary & Grade Configuration Advisory Committee meetings on behalf of the Town of Blackfalds. They have wrapped up the online engagement and have a summary report that will be provided to the School Board, and inperson engagement is planned for mid-May in both the Town of Blackfalds and the City of Lacombe.
- The planning and development of the anticipated new High School continues to be a priority across the department.
- Three different area structure plans have been discussed over the last 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> quarter, including;

#### CKFALD INFRASTRUCTURE AND PROPERTY SERVICES 1ST QUARTER **DIRECTOR'S REPORT**

- The Good Acre draft ASP for the quarter section legally described as NW 36-39-27-W4M, immediately east of Greystone Ranch, has undergone internal review with comments provided back to the consultant. The consultant is now preparing the required technical studies and will have an updated ASP for review submitted within the next few months.
- The Aspen Lakes West ASP amendment, which was necessary to accommodate the new Catholic elementary school, is expected to be submitted for review soon.
- The Rolling Hills developer and their consultant submitted a preliminary concept plan for internal review earlier this guarter. They are currently working on an update of the concept plan, once a concept plan is settled on, the next step is to update the ASP to support the final phase...
- The Soper ASP, which has no previous revisions, has been discussed at a very high level at our last annexation meeting. With these ideas being implemented into the servicing and other high-level planning of this future annexation.

#### **CAPITAL UPDATE:**

- Phase 2a and Phase 3 of the Wetland. Trunk and Outfall system has been constructed by DB Bobcat. Phase 3, the county section, in this quarter, is completed. Winter construction on Phase 2A has started and is almost completed. Work continues into the spring with planned seasonal works as ground conditions allow east of the pond. Fortis has completed the moving the overhead power line.
- We have completed the NW Stormwater Masterplan Environmental Appeal Board mediation and hearing, we still await the Board's and Minister's decision, no new news since the last quarterly report.
- The Womacks / Gregg Street Road and Rail Improvements Project was going well with 90% of the roadway and parking lot structure along with parking lot lighting, curbs and sidewalks is completed on the west side of the rail line. Construction delays with Fortis and CP Rail crews have caused significant delays. Border worked to get the parking lot, Westwood, Stanley and the western portion of the Womacks extension in place. The eastern portion of the project to the tie in points on Gregg Street are delayed until spring of 2022 when CP Rail / Shaw complete their portion of the remaining work. The paved parking lots are working well for the EBC to date. The highway 2A intersection configuration option 2 has been chosen by Council. The design and change order will be forthcoming later this month. Contractors will be out working within the next 2-4 weeks.
- Duncan Avenue the Leung Road upgrades Phase 1 construction is 95% completed. The pavement is all completed and the outstanding surface work and landscaping will occur in the spring of 2022. Contractors will be out working within the next 2-4 weeks.

#### INFRASTRUCTURE AND PROPERTY SERVICES 1<sup>ST</sup> QUARTER DIRECTOR'S REPORT

- The new McKay Ranch Lift Station tendering underway with Stantec, the tender
  is now closed and this project will be coming back to Council. This project will be
  located at the end of Eastpoint drive, north of the existing MacKay Mobile Park
  area. This Lift Station will service all future areas in the immediate area as well
  as serve as a cascading lift station for services east of the existing Cottonwood
  schools site.
- Bulk Fuel Station planning activities are underway, including identifying scope and costs.

#### PROGRESS ON PROJECTS/PROGRAMS:

- The department completed the FCM MAMP Grant submission requirements by the January 31, 2022 deadline. We are pleased to report the Town successfully met all its deliverable requirements and will be receiving \$38,435 grant.
- Following up to the environmental field investigations conducted in 2021, the
  Town received the final Phase 2 ESA and cap assessment addendum. As per
  the Best Management Practice, annual monitoring for groundwater, surface
  water, gas and surface inspection will be done 2x/year (spring and fall). This will
  be done on an ongoing basis until baseline conditions are established (providing
  no offsite contamination), then reduced to 1x/year.
- The implementation of the asset management module of the new Citywide PSD Asset Management and Work Order software program is now complete. The Service Request system was completed in October and being used both internally and externally for any new requests. The next phase of the work order program implementation will be to identify work order types using internal staff resources (no contractor support) and will be to identify work orders for the Parks, and Facilities departments.

SUBJECT: Alberta Rural Health Week Proclamation

#### **BACKGROUND:**

May 30 – June 3, 2022 is Alberta Rural Health Week. Alberta Rural Health Week is a great opportunity to honour the contributions of rural Alberta healthcare providers and community volunteers who help keep health care close to home.

Rural health providers are powerful assets in our communities. Not only do their health care skills and practices enhance the quality of rural life, but these professionals also contribute to rural life on a more personal level. They have special relationships with their community, they not only provide care, but are also family, friends, neighbours, and volunteers, and often teach and mentor future healthcare providers within their communities.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

Blackfalds Bike Rodeo will take place on June 1<sup>st</sup>, 2022 at the Eagle Builders Centre in the new arena. In order to capitalize on the foot traffic at the Bike Rodeo and in honour of Alberta Rural Health Week, staff will be inviting healthcare and allied healthcare providers in the community to showcase their businesses on the concourse of the arena. Tables will be set up for residents and visitors to approach and learn more about health services in the community and surrounding region. 

#### **BACKGROUND:**

In 2016, the Town of Blackfalds engaged in an All Star Park Master Plan to determine the overall future use of that space. It was determined that the parking lot be expanded to the west to ensure adequate parking is made available, in conjunction with the Duncan Avenue upgrades. The tender was prepared by Stantec and placed on APC on March 16<sup>th</sup>.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

The All Star Park Parking Lot tender closed on March 31<sup>st</sup>. We received four tender submissions for the project. The contractors and pricing are provided below:

Contractor	Amount (GST not included)
Border Paving Ltd.	\$236,401.49
DB Bobcat Services Ltd.	\$250,752.20
Bettenson's Sand and Gravel Ltd.	\$256,921.60
TJ Paving Ltd.	\$311,893.80

A 10% contingency is included in all submission pricing. Stantec has estimated an additional \$19,000 for surveying, testing, project management, etc.

Administration met with Stantec to review the submissions. Administration recommends proceeding with Border Paving Ltd. for the All Star Park parking lot expansion project.

#### **FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS:**

The capital budget amount for this project is \$250,000. Administration is confident that the project will be carried out on budget with management of the contingency.

#### ADMINISTRATIVE RECOMMENDATION:

That Council moves to accept the recommendation of Administration to award the All Star Park Parking Lot Expansion tender to Border Paving Ltd. in the amount of \$236,401.49.

Minor mathematical errors were found in the unit price schedule submitted by Bettenson's Sand and Gravel, and TJ Paving.



#### Dear Premier,

We are committed to ensuring Albertans live in safe communities that support their health and well-being. Communities where people have reliable access to critical health, social, public safety, and educational services. Ultimately, Albertans living in a safe and healthy community communicate those needs to the Government of Alberta, who listen and respond.

The Government of Alberta has lost the trust of its constituents in its pursuit of an Alberta Provincial Police Service (APPS) by not undertaking fulsome, open, and transparent consultations with all those affected. Albertans have stated loud and clear that they do not want a costly new police service, with an overwhelming 84% of Albertans wanting to keep and improve the Alberta RCMP.

In addition, the Government of Alberta has not released a detailed funding model explaining who would be paying the costs of this proposed transition. The vague Transition Study noted initial transition costs of \$366 million over six years, and, at minimum, an additional \$139 million each year, increasing with inflation. Municipalities know that most of these costs will be downloaded directly to them, forcing them to significantly increase residents' and businesses' taxes.

Municipalities and engaged Albertans continue to call on the Government of Alberta to improve rural police response times and increase resources available to the justice system. The Province's \$2 million Transition Study did not highlight how a new APPS would address any of these issues.

We, the undersigned, call on the Government of Alberta to stop efforts and investment to advance the creation of an Alberta Provincial Police Service and instead invest in resources needed to:

- Improve current policing services to reduce response times and address rural crime by increasing the number of RCMP officers within communities
- Improve social services to address the root causes of crime (health, mental health, social and economic supports)
  - Expand Police and Crisis Teams with police and Alberta Health Services
  - Work with communities to provide targeted social supports
- Increase resources within the justice system
  - Ensure timely trials by prioritizing violent over non-violent crimes
  - Hire more Crown prosecutors and appoint more Provincial Court Judges

#### **Protective Services**

#### **Town of Blackfalds Municipal Enforcement:**

March was a busy month for Officers, with call volume increasing they were still able to focus on proactive enforcement and education initiatives. Approximately 15 combined hours were spent in school zones. Of concern is that we are still seeing vehicle passing school busses stopped with red lights flashing, 3 violation tickets were issued during the month for these infractions

63 municipal files were opened and investigated. Officers continued to work with the public works department assisting in the removal of vehicles off the street for snow clearing, 3 vehicles were towed throughout the month related to snow removal. 12 Animal control files were opened 11 of these relating to dogs mostly being running at large and complaints of barking. 11 files were opened associated to the traffic bylaw with 4 dealing with snow on sidewalks and 7 abandoned vehicles. Eight files were opened under the Community Standards Bylaw, with 4 relating to Noise, 3 Unsightly Premise and one Bullying complaint. Officers assisted the RCMP on 4 separate files throughout the month.

Two joint forces traffic enforcement operations were held in the town with cooperation from Blackfalds RCMP Detachment, Blackfalds ITU, Lacombe County Peace Officers, and Blackfalds Municipal Enforcement. Following the Alberta Traffic Safety calendar these focussed on seatbelts and aggressive drivers, in total 20 violation tickets were issued.

Parking complaints were down this month receiving only 7 complaints. Three vehicles were towed and impounded as abandoned vehicles during this time, attempts to contact owners were made however unsuccessful.

The Animal Control Officer continued to do many patrols throughout the community and in one instance assisted the RCMP where they required a dog to be looked after due to the owner having a medical emergency.

With the assistance of Public Works, overnight truck parking signage on Parkwood Road was moved, parking is now permitted on Parkwood from the north end of the hotel parking lot to the entrance of Tim Hortons on the west side of the road. Parking violations have been issued to trucks not complying with the signage provided.

On February 22<sup>nd</sup>, Community Peace Officer Joe Croken was recognized for his service, receiving the 12-year Provincial service medal, which was presented by Mayor Hoover.

The two Red Deer College practicum students completed their time with the department, and once again this was a successful partnership with the college we look forward to future placements.

One municipal enforcement officer and the D/Chief attended an AFRRCS radio programming course and are now trained to do this work locally.

Two officers attended a Traffic Stop tactics training course and were successful in completion of this.

#### Violation tickets issued

In total 130 violation tickets were issued during the month of March, 93 of these were through our E-ticketing system in the vehicles, 37 were issued to registered owners in the mail. Total violation fines issued during the month was \$32,528.

44 tickets were issued under the Use of Highway and Rules of the Road Regulations, 70 violations were issued under the Traffic Safety Act, 10 under the Vehicle Equipment Regulation, 1 under the Operator Licensing and Vehicle control Regulation, 2 under the Traffic Bylaw, as well as 3 under the Animal Control Bylaw.

#### Speed Signs:

During the month of March speed signs were placed on Park Street West bound and Vista Trail South Bound.

#### Park Street WB:

The total vehicle count, February 28 to April 1<sup>st</sup> was 43,686. The average speed recorded was 42 kmh. Attached is the statistics summary report for this period.

#### **Vista Trail South Bound:**

The total vehicle count from February 28 to April 1<sup>st</sup>, was 51,270. During this time the average speed was 52 kmh.

SUBJECT: BOLT KPI Report Information - March 2022

#### BACKGROUND:

In 2012, a Regional Transit Partnership was formed between the City of Red Deer (CRD), the Town of Blackfalds and the City of Lacombe to provide traditional public transit service between Red Deer, Blackfalds and Lacombe as well as local bus service within Blackfalds and Lacombe. Unfortunately, a notice of motion passed at the City of Lacombe Council meeting on September 23, 2020 ultimately ending the BOLT regional partnership ceasing operational service on August 28<sup>th</sup>, 2020. Fortunately, the Town of Blackfalds was able to quickly move forward with procurement of a service contractor, purchase of a wheelchair accessible van and finalized an on-demand transit service model for our Town. This new BOLT 2.0 allows for five-day service from 6:00 am to 8:00 pm with many more boarding options for our residents and visitors within town and one stop at the Kingston Hub at the north end of Red Deer.

Since September 1, 2020, the Town of Blackfalds has been operating the new BOLT 2.0 service as an on-demand digital community commuter service. Our new service provider, application, schedule, ticket procurement and service stop maps have been working well over the course of this new service model. More information is available for riders and the public at the link below.

#### **DISCUSSION:**

The first page of the report shows the March stats and associated mapping, while the remainder of the pages outlines the trending comparison since start of the year. The data dates are highlighted in the white box on the left side of each sheet for reference.

At the end of May 2022, we will be adding sister stops on the opposite side of all the existing virtual and physical stops. These stops on the opposite side of the roadway will allow more efficient routing of the vehicle also more convenance to our riders to customize their stop locations. Proper notification will be provided to the public, our website map will be updated and the riders will get notified of their final stop within 15 mins of the planned pick up time.

# HIGHLIGHTS OF THE REGULAR COUNCIL MEETING MARCH 24, 2022

#### TOWN OF ECKVILLE - NURSE PRACTITIONER PROGRAM

Following a presentation to Council on February 28, 2022, from the Wolf Creek Primary Care Network, a request was made by the Town of Eckville to participate in the Nurse Practitioner Program. The Town of Eckville asked Lacombe County to provide an annual funding contribution of \$33,500 over a three-year term to offset costs required to support a Nurse Practitioner for the Town of Eckville and the surrounding area.

A motion that Lacombe County participate in the Nurse Practitioner Program proposed by the Town of Eckville by contributing \$10,000 in annual funding towards this program for a three-year period did not receive the approval of Council.

#### RC(1) CITY OF LACOMBE

Council approved resolutions to contribute up to \$175,388 to the City of Lacombe's annual capital projects at the Lacombe Memorial Centre, Kinsmen Aquatic Centre, and Gary Moe Sports Arena. Lacombe County will fund this contribution from the Recreation Capital Assistance Reserve.

In addition, Council approved a contribution of up to \$20,000 toward the City of Lacombe's Columbarium expansion at the Lacombe Fairview Cemetery, which will be funded through the Cemetery Capital Reserve.

#### LACOMBE COUNTY VISION, GOALS & RESULTS

On March 8 and 9, 2022, Lacombe County Council participated in a Strategic Planning Workshop to develop a new strategic plan for the four-year period of 2022-2025.

With the completion of the workshop, the consultant has now compiled the Draft Vision, Goals and Results developed from the thoughts, ideas and input of Council from the workshop.

Council approved the Vision, Goals and Results as revised, and directed the County Manager to move forward with developing the Lacombe County Strategic Plan 2022 to 2025.

#### POLICE ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Lacombe County Council voted in favour of becoming a member of the Blackfalds RCMP Detachment/Red Deer County Police Advisory Committee. Reeve Barb Shepherd was appointed as the Lacombe County representative to the Committee, and Councillor Dwayne West was appointed as the alternate.

#### PARKING FEES FOR SUNBREAKER COVE/SANDY POINT

Council defeated a motion to include a provision in the fee schedule for parking and launching at the Sunbreaker Cove boat launch and Sandy Point Beach and boat launch; that County citizens be exempt from paid parking by providing ratepayers free seasonal parking passes; and that one terminal be available at Sunbreaker Cove boat launch and Sandy Point Beach and boat launch for people who cannot pay for parking with a cell phone.

By resolution of Council, an annual parking pass for the Sunbreaker Cove boat launch and Sandy Point Beach and boat launch will be implemented as follows:

Beach Parking Fees \$ 120 Boat Launch & Parking Fees \$ 160 Boat Launch Fees - \$ 80

A motion that an exemption be offered for County ratepayers to allow for a free parking/launching pass for up to two license plates per ratepayer did not receive Council approval.

A motion to amend the above noted resolution to one license plate per ratepayer did not receive Council approval.

#### BYLAW NO. 1364/22 - SYLVAN LAKE COMMUNAL SEWAGE

This spring, Blissful Beach and the Slopes subdivision connected to the Sylvan Lake Communal Sewage System. Council read Bylaw No. 1364/22, which is required for these communities to deliver wastewater to the Commission's system. Bylaw No. 1364/22 revises the wastewater rates for Blissful Beach residents and establishes the wastewater rate for residents of The Slopes.

Council approved first, second and third reading of Bylaw No.1364/22 - Sylvan Lake Communal Sewage Services.

#### RED DEER RIVER WATERSHED ALLIANCE (RDRWA)

A presentation by the RDRWA on the Watershed Management in the Red Deer River Basin was received for information.

#### LIGHTCATCH APP PRESENTATION

A presentation regarding the Lightcatch App was received for information and the County Manager was directed to prepare a report for presentation at a future Council meeting with regard to the Lightcatch App and the proposal from Lightcatch for support (use) by Lacombe County.

#### 6. Requests for Decision

#### 6.1 Community Standards Review

Administration requested direction from Council regarding amendments to the Community Standards Bylaw 468.

Council's Strategic Plan includes a tactic under 'Supporting Community Safety' to review the Community Standards Bylaw 468. Areas proposed for Council consideration include:

- Trees in alleys and over sidewalks
- Classification of weeds to be enforced through the bylaw
- Length of grass/weeds
- Vegetation in sidewalks
- Noise from commercial snow clearing
- Unsightly premises enforcement

Also included is consideration to develop amendments to the Responsible Animal Ownership Bylaws 469 to allow enforcement on school grounds, in conjunction with creating Joint Use Planning Agreements with area school boards.

Engagement for the updated bylaw will include information boards for discussion at the 2022 Spring Trade Show, the City's Social Media channels, the creation of the email <a href="mailto:communitystandards@lacombe.ca">communitystandards@lacombe.ca</a>, and the insertion of information into the bi-weekly City Pages in the local newspaper.

Council accepted the Community Standards Review as information

#### 6.2 On Street Patio Policy

Administration proposed an update to the "On-Street Patio Policy" (61/256.01 2022PO) in response to operational items identified during the 2020-2021 patio season.

Two areas for improvement were noted for an update to the Policy. First, adding a statement preventing blockage of emergency access features or utilities (such as storm drainage) during patio construction and operation. Secondly, the update allows sidewalk bistro table sets for businesses that may not want a full patio but would like to offer a smaller amount of outdoor seating on the public sidewalk.

Council approved the updated On-Street Patio Policy 61/256.01 2022PO effective March 28, 2022, as amended, and rescinded the existing On-Street Patio Policy 61/256.01 2020PO.

#### 6.3 Land Development Investor Engagement

Administration presented the process used to engage prospective land developers.

The Land Development Investor Engagement: Administrative Directive is intended to:

- Document a process that demonstrates the City's commitment to creating an environment conducive to investment and development
- Build upon (and improve) the City's reputation in the development community as an investment jurisdiction of choice
- Provide an opportunity for the municipality to participate in conceptual level discussions with the developer
- Foster creativity and innovation to remove barriers and explore opportunities
- Promote positive relationship building between the developer and staff

Council accepted the Land Development Investor Engagement: Administrative Directive as information.

#### 6.4 Affordable Housing Steering Committee (Terms of Reference Amendment)

Council established the Affordable Housing Steering Committee as a Committee of Council at their June 28, 2021, meeting.

The terms of reference mention the committee's size and the need to represent a cross-section of community interests. Administration recommended an amendment to include permanent representation for Lacombe & District Family and Community Support Services (FCSS) on the committee.

Council approved the revised Affordable Housing Steering Committee Terms of Reference as presented.

#### 8. In Camera

#### 8.2 Legal (FOIP Section 16)

Council approved the Vesta Energy Ltd. proposal to purchase the exclusive naming rights to the Eastside Recreation Area as presented and directed Administration to finalize the seven-year agreement.

#### **Digital Service Squad**

- A grant was approved through Community Futures, in partnership with Business Link, Community Futures Central Alberta, Sylvan Lake and the Town of Bentley.
- Instead of one part-time position, there will be three full-time positions. There is more coverage using these partnerships.
- Letters have been sent out to businesses, along with marketing via Facebook and Instagram.

- This is for people with no digital experience, or those who want to look further at analytics and SEO.

#### **Welcome Video**

- Chris noted that BHPARC has undertaken an initiative to create a welcome video. It was for attraction
  of physicians and other healthcare workers.
- The video was created as a welcome video for attraction and retention of all kinds of people businesses, residents, etc. A contractor was hired to create this video and complete it.
- Chris played the video for the Committee.
- The video can be spliced to make different videos to be geared towards different areas of Blackfalds life.

#### **Affordable Housing Assessment**

- Chris noted that FCSS, Ec. Dev. And Planning and Development have been working together to put together a
  memorandum on affordable housing. This information will be used to be brought to Council and goals can be
  noted, possibly a Committee could be formed on this initiative.
- Affordable housing focuses on low income, not seniors housing.
- Lacombe Foundation oversees this in the region.
- This document includes property in town that is not governed by the Lacombe Foundation, average family
  income, and compares data to how much affordable housing Blackfalds currently has. This could potentially
  impact the MSP or Economic Development Strategic Plan.
- Chris shared the work he had done so far on the memorandum.

#### **Economic Development Week - May 9 - 13**

- Chris noted that there is a request to have Council proclaim this week from May 9 13.
- This will be promoted through EDA. There are no planned activities yet, but we will continue what was done
  through small business week. There will be some business appreciation activities that can be run and the
  Committee will be asked for their thoughts.

#### **EDTAC Budget**

- Chris displayed and provided an overview of the Economic Development Budget for review by the Committee.
- Chris reviewed the travel and educational opportunities.

- Chris noted that his budget was cut by \$7500, and wanted to know if there was support from EDTAC to attend the conferences.










# POPULATION HITS NEW HIGH

# **2021 OPERATING BUDGET**


In compliance with the Municipal Government Act (MGA), Administration provided a threeyear operational budget projection to Council in November of 2020.



Town Council formally adopted the Economic Development and Tourism Strategy, a strategic plan that outlines the vision of economic development and tourism sustainability for the Town of Blackfalds over the next decade.



# **PLANNING & DEVELOPMENT**

2021 brought some significant staffing changes to the Planning and Development department as two senior positions were vacated.

We welcomed our new Planning & Development Manager in late September, and two current staff were promoted to more senior positions.

A comprehensive update of the Town's Land Use Bylaw, the primary tool to regulate all uses and development standards within the Town of Blackfalds was developed, and the updated Land Use Bylaw will be presented to Council for adoption in 2022.

The department generated some positive initiatives that created confidence in our local economy despite the overall provinical and national economic conditions:

- The annexation initiated by the land owner of the parcel that surrounds and includes the Mary & Cliff Soper Natural Area.
- Continued dialogue between Town staff and local developers to create new and ancillary area structure plans.
- 234 permits were processed in 2021 with a total value of 21.917M.
- Staff are consulting with both the Public and Catholic school boards as plans for two new schools were announced.

Milestones of 2021 include:

- Completion of the Environmental Stewardship Strategy
- Spring/Fall Clean Up program and electronic recycling roundup
- Advancement of asset data collection with development of various asset class condition assessment templates
- The implementation of the Enterprise Asset Management Software Program which includes Citywide Asset Manager, Maintenance Manager and Citizen Request Portal technology
- AM Summer Student field data collection and GIS/AM desktop support is ongoing for next year
- The former landfill site was surveyed and monitored to help mitigate environmental impacts of the site







# INFRASTRUCTURE SERVICES CONT...

Projects completed in 2021 include:

- The Duncan Avenue extension and Leung Road Phase 1 upgrades where completed.
- The Womacks/Gregg Street re-alignment project including underground improvements and servicing, and mobile home park acquisitions. Remaining work will be completed in 2022 with the closure of the Broadway Avenue railway crossing, completion of the parking lot, resurfacing of Gregg Street, intersection improvements at Highway 2A & Gregg Street, and opening the new Womacks Road railway crossing to traffic.
- Asphalt overlays and sidewalk improvements along Lawton Avenue.
- Pedestrian improvements including a new sidewalk on Parkwood Rd (in front of FasGas) including the installation of flashing

- pedestrian lights.
- The BOLT local transit ondemand system that services Blackfalds to North Red Deer continues to be a valuable service, which is reflected by the continuous growth in ridership
- The new RV Dump Station at All Star Park operated for a first full year.
- The Blackfalds Operations facility was upgraded with Town water and sewer services.
- Phases 2A and 3 construction of the East Area stormwater management project continues into 2022.
- The completion of the Northwest stormwater appeal process awaits a decision from the Environmental Minister in 2022.
- A new motor grader, tandem truck with sander and plow, and three new fleet trucks were purchased.







# **PROTECTIVE SERVICES**

### **Municipal Enforcement**

2021 was a year of change for Municipal Enforcement as we welcomed the addition of two new peace officers and said goodbye to one of our veteran officers and another moved away.

Since December, the department has been fully staffed with four officers. We also added a third vehicle to our fleet.

Due to the ongoing pandemic and health restrictions put in place by the province, officers were not able to organize the Bike Rodeo, and organizers of Kids and Kops also cancelled their event.

Officers patrolled neigbourhoods on their mountain bikes throughout the summer and worked with the RCMP school resource officer on various initiatives. They also participated in the annual Victim Services Charity Check Stop.



In the past year, there were

# 1,176 INVESTIGATIONS.

We installed E-ticketing systems in all enforcement vehicles, which cut down the time officers spent on traffic stops. This improved efficiencies as tickets are immediately sent to the courts.

A total of **653 VIOLATION TICKETS** were issued in 2021.







# PROTECTIVE SERVICES CONT...

#### **RCMP**

In 2021, the Blackfalds RCMP detachment received funding for a significant staff increase by adding two provincially funded officers and one additional officer funded by the municipality.

This provided the detachment with 26 officers overall; nine positions, including a school resource officer funded by the Town of Blackfalds, one position funded by Lacombe County, another by Red Deer County and 15 officers funded by the province.

COVID 19 continued to change the way the RCMP conducted business, procedures were put in place to ensure the safety of officers and the public.



Blackfalds experienced a decrease of

**21%** in **BREAK AND ENTER OFFENSES** in comparison to the previous year.

There was a 15% decrease in MOTOR VEHICLE THEFTS, which is 7 less thefts than in 2020.

THEFT UNDER \$5,000 decreased by 32% (37 less thefts).

In total **PROPERTY CRIME** was down 15%.

Other **CRIMINAL** related files were down **26%**.

We did experience a **7%** increase in **CRIMES AGAINST THE PERSON**.

MOTOR VEHICLE COLLISIONS increased by 34%, an increase of 44 from the previous year.

11 INJURY COLLISIONS and 163 PROPERTY DAMAGE COLLISIONS were recorded.

# PROTECTIVE SERVICES CONT...

### **Fire Department**

The Blackfalds Fire Department had a roster of 26 members in 2021 and is actively recruiting for paid per call members.

In 2021, we focused on providing members with NFPA 1001 Level I and Level II standards training that included vehicle extrication and first aid. Training also included Hazardous Goods Training to meet the NFPA 472 Standards.

We hosted the NFPA 1001 Level 1, Vehicle Extrication, Hazmat, and Pump training from January to October. When provincial health restrictions were lifted in October, the first Open House was held during Fire Prevention Week which attracted a great turnout. The annual Santa Run was a huge success with Santa coming to town over two nights.

Donations exceeded expectations with an overwhelming

**4,393** POUNDS OF FOOD collected and \$870 in CASH DONATIONS.

During 2021, the Fire Department

responded to 184

**EMERGENCY INCIDENTS.** 

**62** of these took place in **LACOMBE COUNTY**.

**38%** of these incidents were

ALARM RESPONSES
followed by 20% of MOTOR
VEHICLE ACCIDENTS

Responses for **MEDICAL CALLS** were up **45%** in 2021.

Dealing with false alarms continues to be an issue.

Most false alarms are a result of poor or lack of maintenance, expired devices, cooking with grease, or not notifying the alarm monitoring company.









### **COMMUNITY SERVICES** Parks & Facilities

## The community of Blackfalds is a leader in building and maintaining award-winning parks and facilities.

With 17% of the total Town budget, parks and facilities continues to impress as it pushes its Recreation and Facilities Master plan forward.

In 2021 alone, the department undertook many projects that enhanced and enriched the community.

- Tree planting, pruning and replacement
- Repair weather damage and ongoing maintenance at Bike Skills Park
- Installed fabric and limestone at Abbey Centre memorial
- · Painting of wood park furniture
- Inspection and maintenance of 12 playgrounds

- Mulch application
- Planting and care of annuals, shrubs and trees
- · Turf maintenance
- · Installation of lights at Tayles Park
- 200m Ashpalt south of Centennial pond, Eastpoint Dr to McKay Ranch new trail development
- · Employed 10 summer students
- Prepare and maintained community gardens
- Installation of new playground at Aurora Heights
- Downtown gardens produced carrots, lettuce, Swiss chard, and cucumbers

### **COMMUNITY SERVICES Parks & Facilities CONT...**

Blackfalds facilities are renowned for their awe-inspiring designs and 2021 was no exception with the completion and the opening of its newest recreational and cultural hub, the Eagle Builders Centre (EBC).

Housing the Blackfalds Bulldogs AJHL hockey club, the new Servus Credit Union Public Library and various meeting and retail spaces, the EBC will be the site of many hockey games and other sport tournaments, community events, concerts, and tradeshows.

The facility generated several projects for Town staff including:

- Two F/T facility operator positions for Eagle Builders Centre operations
- Ice preparation for Arena 1 & 2 at Eagle Builders Centre
- First ice bookings for Arenas 1 & 2
- Acquired and operated new Zamboni 526

The work continued for various other parks and recreation sites:

- All-Star Park hosted six events plus an outdoor drive-in double feature as part of Culture Days
- Minor Soccer and Minor Ball used the soccer fields and ball diamonds this season
- Teamed up with Public Works for the Leung Rd and Lawton Ave tree removal project
- Coordinated the removal of the workshop on Gregg St
- Completed Pine Crescent skateboard park repairs and sound proofing







## **COMMUNITY SERVICES** Abbey Centre

After a 6-month closure due to ongoing pandemic restrictions, the Abbey Centre reopened its doors on June 10.

During the closure and throughout the summer, the Abbey implemented its new program registration system and facility booking software which was launched in October. Despite the closure, staff were able to successfully run summer programs after opening the facility.

The McKay Ranch outdoor aquatic centre was open from June to early Sept, and experienced a busy season.

The facility was closed from January until June 10 when the province relaxed mandates for the summer.

Masks were provincially mandated again in September, 2021, when operations ran at 1/3 capacity.

In November, the facility changed to the Restrictions Exemptions Program (REP) allowing programs to start up and permitting facility bookings.

In keeping with COVID-19 restrictions to serve buffet style an alternative to Breakfast and Lunch with Santa, the Abbey offered 'Snacks with Santa' and handed out individually boxed meals to kids and parents.
